ARTS & CULTURE

1 516 ARTS

516 ARTS provides a venue and opportunities for accomplished local artists to show their work alongside national and international artists. Funding will support operations and programming including educational materials, artist talks, panels, murals, performances, workshops, screenings, public art projects and tours for schools and community groups.



2 OFFCENTER COMMUNITY ARTS

Funding will support free-to-the-public open arts studio with skill-building workshops, and economic development programming (art sales in the gallery, exhibitions and annual, one-day Folk Art Festival) to enhance the lives of over 2,200 low-income, at-risk and homeless artists who will utilize OFFCenter's space and services.



3 OUTPOST PRODUCTIONS

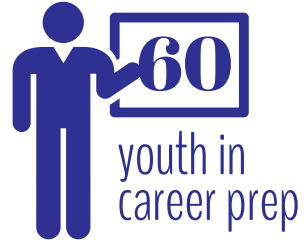
Outpost presents a season of 100 performances by local, regional, national and international artists as well as visual arts exhibits and educational programs for youth and adults. Operating funds will also support the New Mexico Jazz Festival, Outpost's yearly educational programs and the 2017-2018 jazz concert series for approximately 60,000 audience members.



EDUCATION

4 BOYS & GIRLS CLUB OF CENTRAL NM

Funding will support CareerLaunch, a Boys & Girls Clubs of America national curriculum designed to help teens assess interests and strengths, become familiar with career options, set education and career goals, and gain employment skills. 60 youth will: create college and career maps, role play for interviews, and learn business soft skills.



5 CLN KIDS

CLN Kids provides free, trauma-informed, high quality early education to homeless children and helps them catch up academically to their non-homeless peers. Funding is requested to integrate principles of Reggio Emilia into CLN's preschool curriculum, especially beneficial to children with special needs.



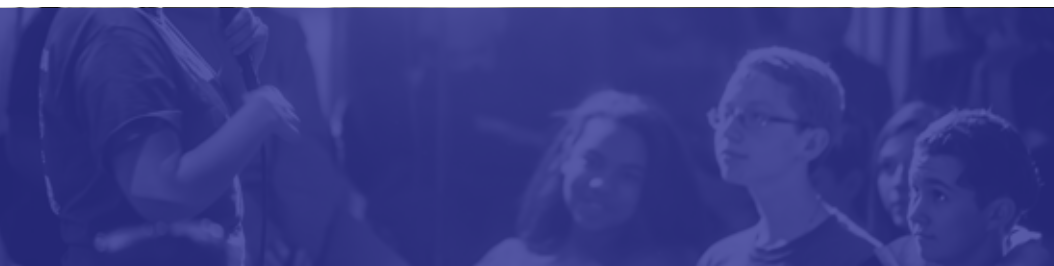
6 GIRL SCOUTS OF NEW MEXICO

Girls Scouts of New Mexico seeks funding to deliver 4 Innovate/Create STEM workshops at an afterschool program to low-income middle school girls in four underserved middle schools in the South Valley and Southeast quadrant where there are unequal numbers of underserved and at-risk girls.



7 JUNIOR ACHIEVEMENT

Funding will support Junior Achievement's Job Shadow program. Through hands-on classroom activities and a daylong site visit, students in the program acquire and apply the skills needed in the workplace. The program will serve 300 students, mostly from Title I schools.



ENVIRONMENT & HISTORIC PRESERVATION

8 CHAMA PEAK LAND ALLIANCE

Funding will be used to develop a "San Juan-Chama: Where Your Water Comes From" message and build upon existing Albuquerque Bernalillo County Water Authority curriculum for middle school students through on-site field trips to private ranches in the San Juan-Chama Watershed.

9 NEW MEXICO WILDLIFE FEDERATION

Funding will support a partnership with the Native American Community Academy to work with 40 high school students to study the dynamics of the Rio Grande River and develop ideas to help preserve and improve the use, health and community knowledge of the river.

10 TRUST FOR PUBLIC LAND

Funds will be used to create and protect more open space for recreation and urban agriculture, which will lead to a strengthening of Bernalillo County's economic vitality. The multiple benefits of preserving open public land in Bernalillo include: improving community and environmental health, delivering cleaner air and drinking water quality, protecting habitats, maintaining agricultural and working ranch lands, and preserving community culture.
